Getting Community Involvement and Volunteers to Your ASF Walk Event

- 1. Make a list of all the community organizations you would like to have represented at your event. Here is a sample list:
 - a. Local Rotary Club
 - b. Local Kiwanis Club
 - c. Local Lions Club
 - d. Local Teen Group (high school Key Club)
 - e. Fire Department
 - f. Police Department
- 2. Go online and look up the contact person for each group and call or send them an email something like this:

3. Once you are on their calendar, pull together the following to bring with you to the meeting:

- a. *One of your other leaders* (it is always good to present as a team and provide support to each other).
- b. Brochures on AS. Some were sent to you in fundraising packet. If you need more, contact Kitty.
- c. Flyer with information about your specific Walk.
- d. Sponsorship forms and Donation in Kind Forms.
- e. Promotional items (such as ASF Face masks). If you need some items, contact Kitty Murphy.
- f. PowerPoint presentation on Angelman Syndrome, and/or one of our AS videos to show to the group.
- g. Write up about 2 minutes of notes about your personal story, how AS affects your family and how the ASF is here to assist families as well as invest in research towards a cure.
- h. Something to show the video/PowerPoint presentation on. Check with the leader of the group to see if they have the equipment/audio to project your presentation on a screen. If not, find out if the group is small enough to view a laptop presentation.
- i. End your presentation by handing out a flyer about your Walk event and invite them to participate and or sponsor if they are able. Make sure to give a fundraising packet to the leader of the group containing a sponsorship letter, donation form, brochure, and walk flyer.
