






Margaret DeRamus, MS, CCC-SLP, is a licensed speech language pathologist at the Carolina Institute for Developmental Disabilities (CIDD) and clinical instructor in the Department of Psychiatry in the School of Medicine at the University of North Carolina (UNC) at Chapel Hill. With over 20 years of experience working with individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, Margaret participates in several interdisciplinary clinic teams and a variety of research projects, conducting developmental, speech, language, augmentative and alternative communication (AAC), and autism evaluations.
